#### Hello, world, it's me



Every life is a story, and every writer is a storyteller.

- Ice Breaker: If you could be any character in a book, who would you be?

#### Why didn't I think of that?



Every journey begins with one step, and every story starts with an idea.

Where do story ideas come from?

- A poster on a phone pole
- An abandoned house on a country road
- A conversation overheard in a diner

Where do you get your ideas?

#### I have an idea: now what?



Character is story ... story is character.

Who do you need to tell your story?


- Who is your protagonist?
- What do they want?
- Why must they tell this story?
- What is at stake?
- Who will try to stop them? A villain? A holder of secrets? A jealous lover? What or who is the equal and opposing force?

## Genre: So you want to write a [romance, mystery, thriller, short story, novella ...]



- Every genre has basic rules and formats
- Learn the rules before you break them
- The hero (almost) always wins
- Readers have expectations: don't leave them feeling cheated
- Romance is ruthless: happy ending or else
- A word on literary fiction

### Inside the outline: Using your trusty map



- Know your ending (or at least your destination)
- A little outline? A lot? A hybrid?
- Flexibility: An outline is not a straight jacket
- What next? An action point list
- "Writer's block" and how to get unstuck
  - Word count (if it's your thing)
  - Timers, reminders, and other useful methods
  - The 'WHAT IF' list (imagine that!)

#### He said, she said, I said, we said: Point of View




- What is Point of View?
- The I's have it: third person or first person?
- Alternating POVs
- Exposition: information and scene setting don't overdo it (handout)
- Dialogue: the illusion of conversation (handout)
- Sparing the details: clear, clean, precise
- It's the economy: less really is more
- A word on continuity

#### Side plates: Getting input, mentors, and peers



- Choosing who reads your manuscript
- Everyone's a critic
- The importance of mentors, classes, teachers, and peers
- Writing is re-writing: polish, polish, polish
- And then it flew away ... knowing When to end

- Self-publishing or a 'traditional publisher'?
- Exclusivity versus wide distribution
- Marketing and promotion / paid and free
- Fasten your headphones: a word on audiobooks
  - Royalty share / pay per hour / selfnarrating
